JOSEPH W. HOBBS – The Last Whiskey Baron? - part 2

After the First World War, the brothers Joseph and Basil return to Canada.

1918 Mabel Dell Mabel Dell and Joseph have a son. He gets the same name as his father, grandfather, and great-grandfather – Joseph, and later in life will be active in whisky.

In late 1919, Joseph W. is on an expedition to find suitable sites for air bases along the coast of British Columbia. He is on the ship Stadacona. He buys the ship in March 1924 and sells it a month later. This ship is involved in rum-running. 1920 Joseph W. moves from Sault Ste Marie, Ontario to Vancouver. He is appointed head of the Vancouver Air Service Association, becomes president of the Vancouver Flying Club, and becomes a member of the Vancouver Automobile Club. He starts a business and both he and his wife quickly become part of the society in Vancouver.

Joseph W. was a person who liked speed and he and a friend are fined for racing their cars in downtown Vancouver. He makes many trips to England and becomes an agent for W.A. Gilbey, Peter Dawson and the Taylor Brothers. An example of his sense of business is when he makes a "deal" with a Canadian company to deliver 50,000 wooden boxes to Gilbey in England.

He early registers the "Sandy MacNab" whisky brand. A whisky brand that has an interesting history and will become his whisky much later.

In 1917, all provinces in Canada, except Quebec, had alcohol prohibition, but it ended completely in 1921. However, the sale of alcohol in Canada is regulated.

In 1924 he was appointed head of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (RNVR). The appointment is delayed "when it was discovered the nautical experience of the proposed commander, J.W. Hobbs, included rum-running."

I will return to rum-running in later parts.

Things are going well for Joseph W. and in 1924 he has a residence built on the fashionable Laurier Avenue in Vancouver for \$25,000.

The brother Basil gets top positions in the build-up of Canadian air defence and becomes a major. In October 1920, the first trans-Canada flight takes place. Basil Hobbs and Roger Leckie who shot down the Zeppelin in 1917, first fly the first part in a Fairey seaplane. The flight will not be completely undramatic. In the turbulent weather, the engine cover tears off and hits the fuel pump. The two are soaked in gasoline and forced to make an emergency landing on the Saint John River. They order a new plane and continue the flight. In total, the flight across Canada takes 10 days and the total flight time was 49 hours and the distance 5250 km. It is performed by 8 people in 6 different aircrafts.

!925 Basil resigns from the Royal Canadian Air Force and becomes a partner in his brother's company, but he is stationed in Montreal. The third partner in the firm is Colonel. O.F. Brothers. In 1925, the brothers visit W.H. Holt, Manchester (who own Aberlour distillery) and

they both become directors of this company. The history of this company will come in a later part.

Joseph W. makes lots of trips to England. In 1927 he has travelled across the Atlantic 22 times and in November of that year he and Fred G. Johnston buy the Merchants Exchange Building in Vancouver from A. Melville Dollar for \$400,000. Joseph and Fred were schoolmates from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. On the ground the Marine Building will be built – Joseph will lose a lot of money on this project. Fred will be sentenced to prison. More on this in a later part.


Trans-Continental Aviators Meet With Disaster at Start

Seaplane Wrecked Northeast of St. John Shortly After Commencement of Coast-to-Coast Flight; Colonel Leckie and Major Hobbs Uninjured.

St. John, N.B., Oct. 7.—Colonel Robert Leckie and Major Basil Hobbs, who hopped off this morning from Halifax for a trans-Canada flight to Vancouver, crashed a short time later at Long Beach, twenty miles northeast of St. John. Their light seaplane was wrecked but the aviators apparently were uninjured, as Colonel Leckie telephoned here for another flying boat.

The two Canadian Air Force aviators, who took off at 8 o'clock for Riviere du Loup on the first leg of their journey, sped over this city at 10.45 apparently going strong. Colonel Leckie's urgent message for another seaplane was interpreted here as meaning that he intended resuming his flight immediately.


